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Industry Limited Secure Employee Arrested for Allegedly Abusing Resident

Incident Reported to NYS Justice Center for the Protection of People with Special Needs Hotline

Rush, NY-- NYS Justice Center for the Protection of People with Special Needs Special Prosecutor Patricia E. Gunning announced today that Jamil Porter (DOB: 12/24/67), who is employed as an aide at Industry Limited Secure Residential Center has been arrested for allegedly abusing a resident following an investigation conducted by the Justice Center. Industry Limited Secure is a juvenile justice facility operated by the NYS Office of Children and Family Services.

The incident first came to the attention of law enforcement officials when it was reported to the Justice Center's Vulnerable Persons Central Register (VPCR) Hotline. A call center representative opened a case tracking file and Justice Center investigators launched an investigation and made the arrest.

Porter, who lives at 752 Seward Street, Rochester, was arrested on November 11, 2013 on a Misdemeanor Complaint charging him with:

- One count of Endangering the Welfare of a Child, a class "A" Misdemeanor; and
- One count of Harassment in the Second Degree, a Violation.

According to the complaint, the defendant allegedly engaged in a verbal altercation with a youth, pushed him up against a wall and held him until other staff members intervened. Porter, who was on probation at the time of the alleged incident, has been terminated. He was issued an appearance ticket for November 25, 2013 to be arraigned on the charge in Town of Rush Court. The case is being prosecuted by the Monroe County District Attorney's office.

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The Justice Center and its statewide hotline and incident reporting system began operations on June 30, 2013. It is staffed 24-hours a day, seven days a week by trained professionals who receive reports of allegations of abuse and neglect of people with special needs. Once a report is received by its (VPCR) Hotline, it is logged and assessed. Serious cases of abuse or neglect are assigned to the Justice Center’s investigation team or, when appropriate, to a local law enforcement agency for follow-up.

The Justice Center also maintains a statewide registry of all persons who have been found to be responsible for serious or repeated acts of abuse and neglect. Once placed on the registry, known as the “Staff Exclusion List” or SEL, they are prohibited by law from ever working again with people with disabilities or special needs.

The Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS) is one of six state agencies under the jurisdiction of the Justice Center. It also oversees certain facilities or programs that are operated, licensed or certified by the Office of Mental Health (OMH), the Department of Health (DOH), the Office for People With Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD), the Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS), and the State Education Department (SED).
